034 - Sustainable SU Shop

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Union Notes

- 1. It is estimated, in the UK, five million tonnes of plastic is used every year, nearly half of which is packaging¹
- 2. That in a recent (2020) sustainability survey by the Students' Union, the majority of student respondents felt that reducing single-use plastics on campus was the main 'green' aim that the SU should be focusing on
- 3. Currently, the SU Shop stocks essential food items in single-use plastic packaging
- 4. Keele Students' Union have successfully implemented a zero-waste area in their Union shop which offers food, toiletries, and other sustainable products²

Union Believes

- 1. The Students' Union should take steps to reduce plastic waste by converting a section of the SU Shop into a zero-waste area where students are able to choose to go plastic free
- 2. Leeds Trinity SU has already made significant progress in this area by stocking sustainable products and banning single-use plastic freebies
- 3. That this policy could also build on the work done by the Students' Union to introduce sustainable menstrual products into the SU Shop
- 4. Plastic packaging significantly contributes to plastic waste and should therefore be the next focus for the SU
- 5. That refill stations can also be more convenient and cheaper for students as products can be bought in bulk

Union Resolves

- 1. That the SU should significantly reduce the amount of plastic packaging in the SU Shop
- 2. To mandate the Vice President and Sustainability Officer to work on introducing a refill area into the SU Shop, based on existing models such as those mentioned at Keele SU and ASDA in Leeds³; this refill area should include products such as pasta, rice, cereal, tea bags, coffee, and sugar
- 3. To mandate the Vice President and Sustainability Officer to expand the current bottle top recycling scheme outside the SU Shop
- 4. To mandate the Vice President and Sustainability officer to introduce a recycling centre in the SU Shop where students are able to recycle items such as batteries, make-up, clothing, crisp packets and other items that are difficult to recycle
